Private Police Barracks Dec 12 - 1850
Dear Sir,
Many thanks for your letter of 30 last month and be assured I should not have taken any open steps to ascertain the disposition of natives in this district & part with lands unless I had been ordered by a high official functionary so to do - however, nothing more has been done than that with which you are acquainted and as far as my observations now lead me, the knotted question appears to be slumbering although I fancy an eye is ~~at~~ on the alert for your return, when this complicated subject will be again revived and for they are capable of grappling with it with any chance of a successful issue.

Te Tokerau keeps close with his
people and I did hear that he had
no intention to abandon his secluded
life until your return when he purposed
coming into Town - I have seen him
and should know him again and

My wife possesses a very correct
idea of your duties at the South, and
was therefore quite contented to
