
My Dear Sir,

I arrived here at daylight yesterday morning from Auckland, we left there at 8 O'Clock A.M. on Thursday, the "Hottentot" also left shortly after, I put my sofa some chairs and several other things on board of her, for the Capt. to land here, but she failed and never called here, she was to have called here according to her Contract, (weather permitting) and to communicate with you, I hope when you pay Capt. Peto's account you will deduct the freight and expenses in forwarding the things he has of mine down here, I have been obliged to leave many of my things behind.
