I have just paid 150 a year for the remaining 10 years he is bound to pay 200 a year & all the taxes. - I understand he has built on the ground but I don't know if they are valuable buildings. - Wagonmen has merited in value but since the removal of the troops it is said likely to fall again. I shall write Allan & Low Cap proposed to fill provided I am offered a good price, I shall regard them

put it down at that sum. -


I don't like to ask
