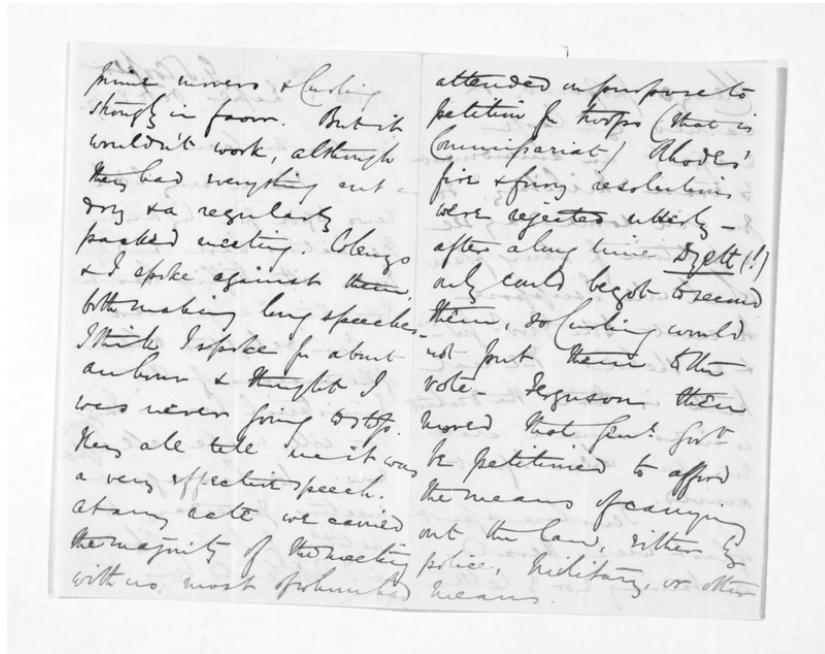


6 pages written 21 Oct 1857 by George Sisson Cooper in Napier City to Sir Donald McLean

& ? It would bring the

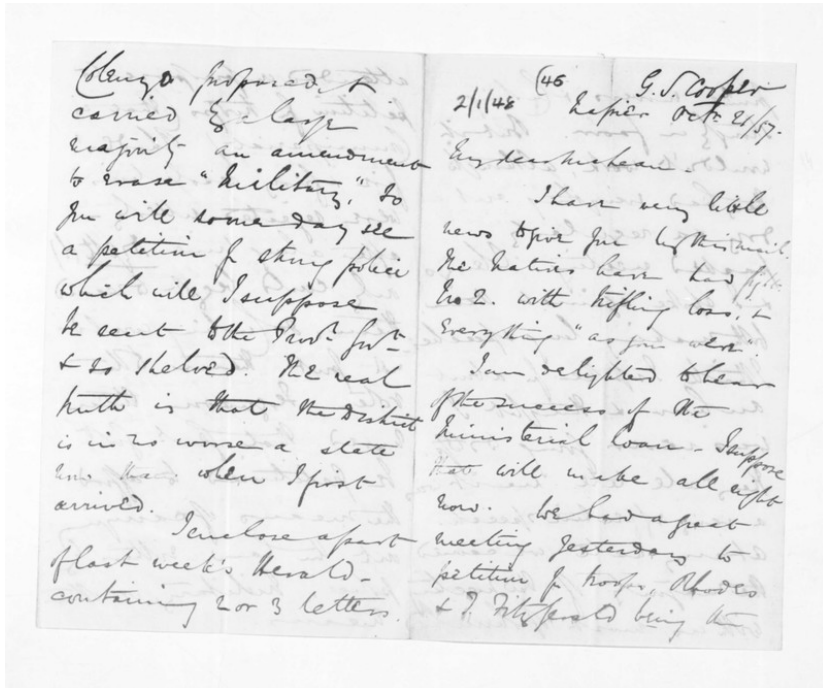




# MANUSCRIPTS & PICTORIAL
