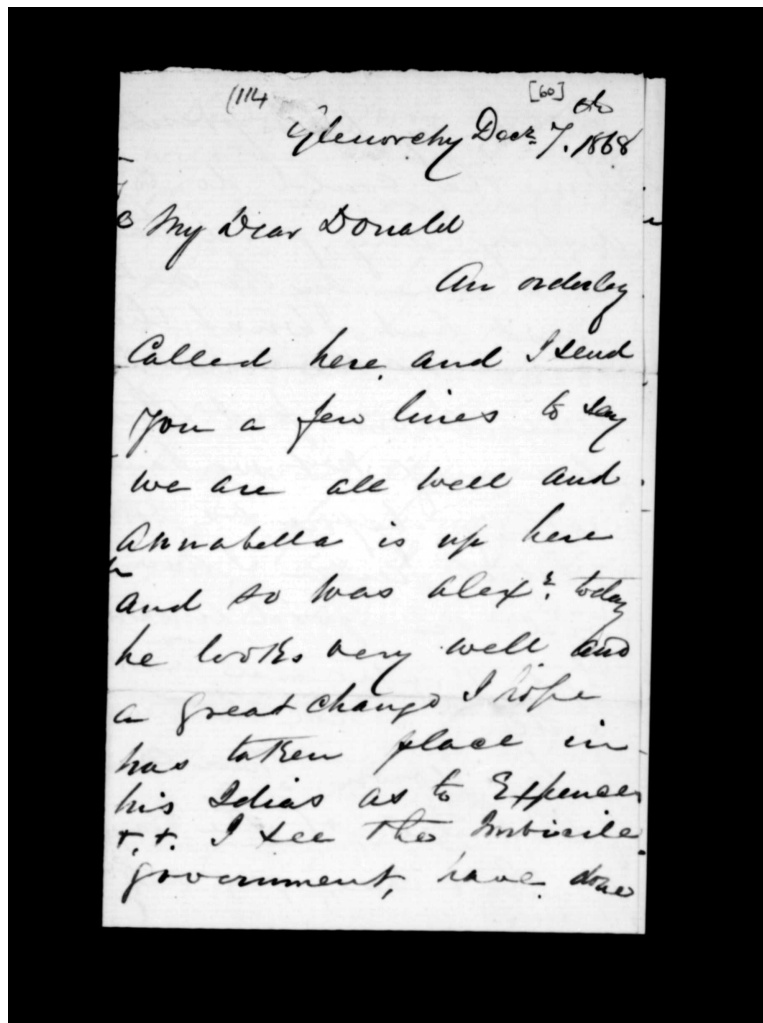

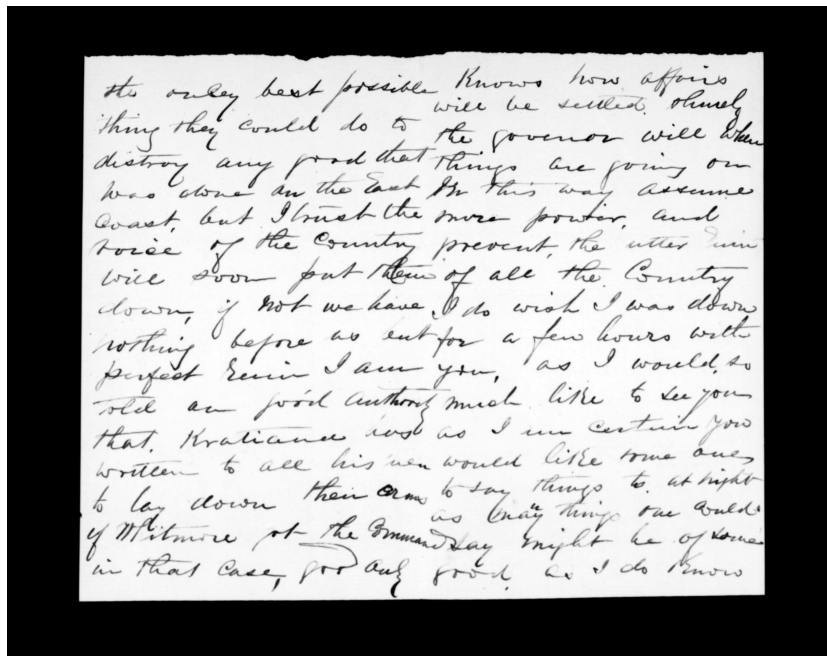

My dear Donald



Shurely the Governor will when things are going on in this way assume more power and prevent the utter ruin of all the country.
