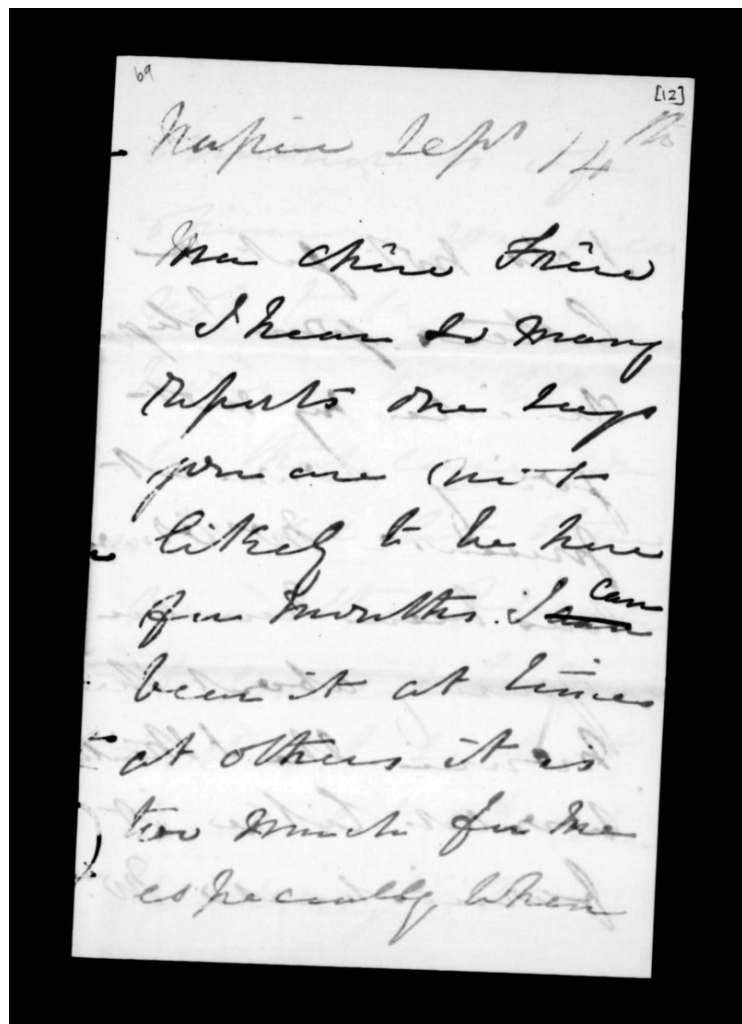

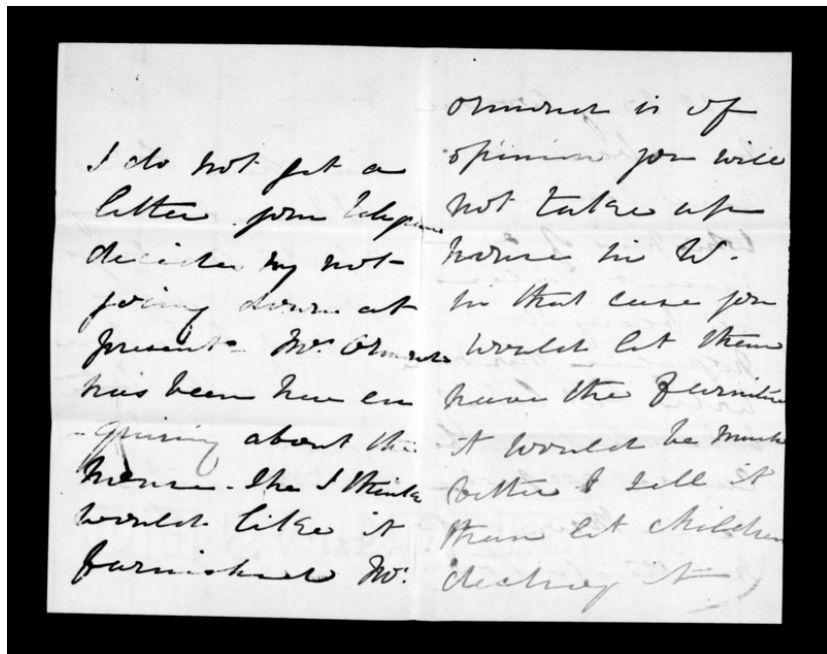


I hear so many reports one says you are not likely to be here for months. I can bear it at times, at others it is too much for me especially when

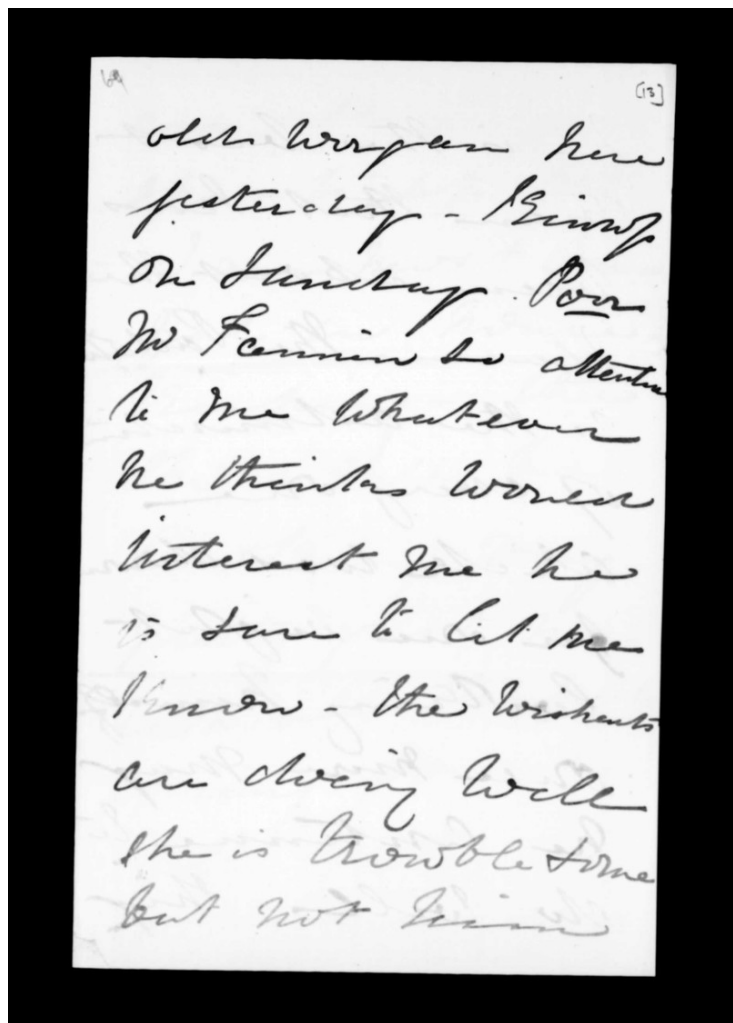

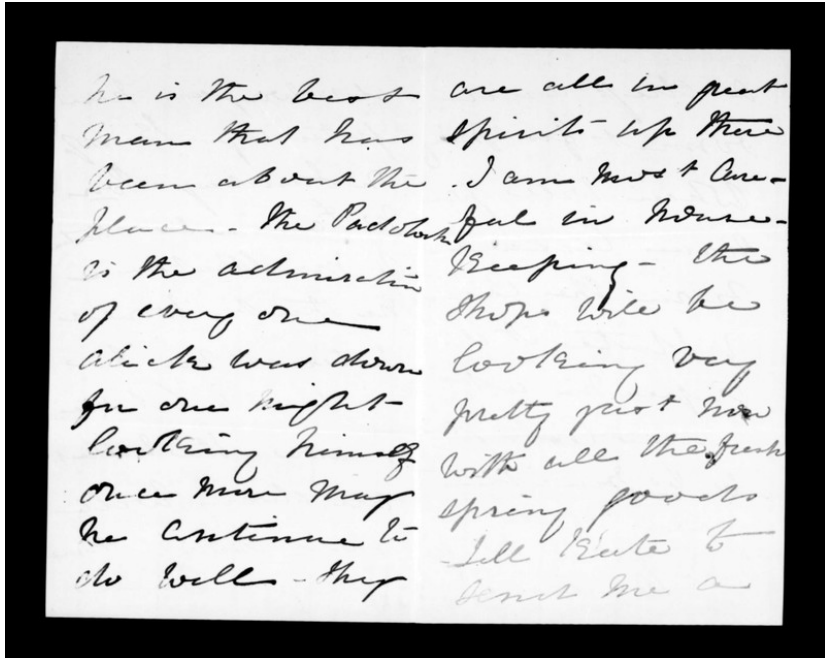


