



My dear Mr. McLean



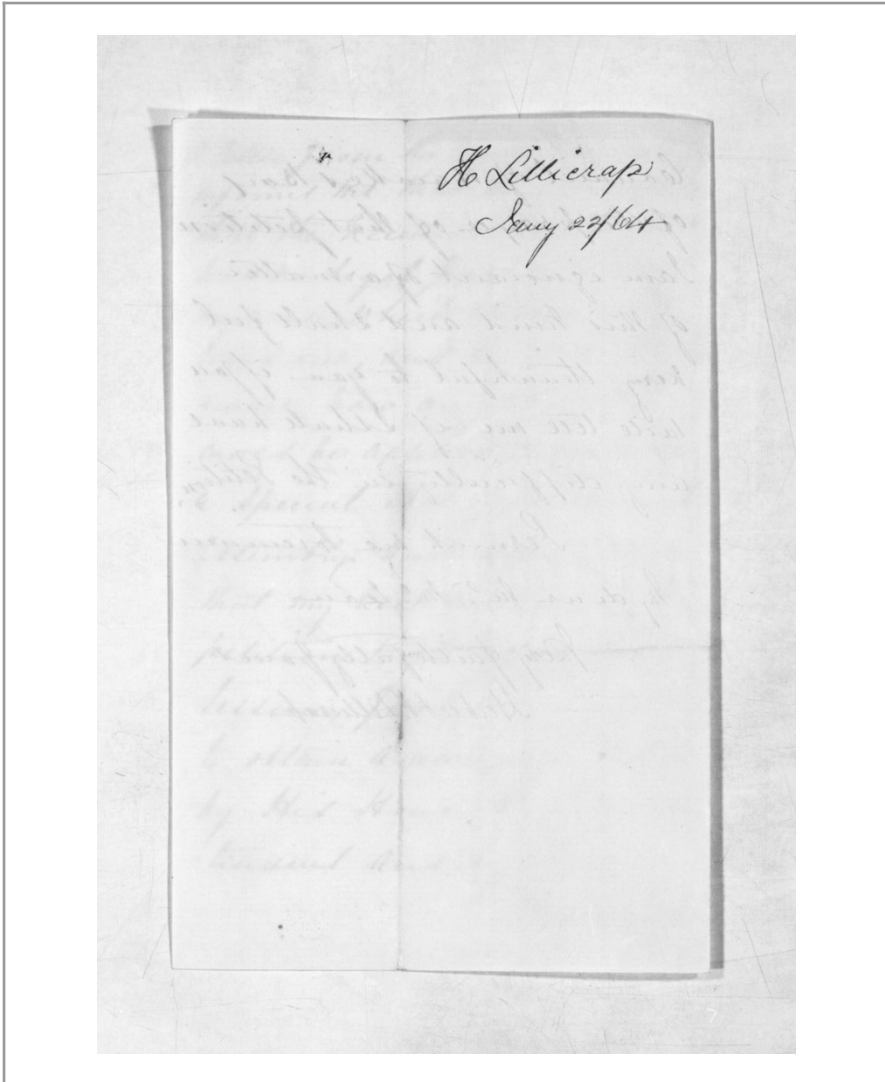


A letter from the Under Secretary
