Dear Sir

I sent you a note from the Waikato about a fortnight ago, containing an order upon you from Mr Whitely, which I hope has been delivered to you.

In my last, I think, I mentioned that Waitona had been to Auckland. He went in pursuance of a letter from the "Native Secretary," but when he got there, Mr Symonds informed him that the Surgeon was past repair, and that he would see what he could get for him as payment for his pigs. Our old friend Hiri happened to be at Auckland too, and he accompanied Mr Waitona to the N. S. Office, and also to Government House. His Excellency had sent Mr Mirand to fetch them from the Sheeshero's place. They appear to have been highly pleased with the Governor's kindness, and present of a bag of sugar and flour. On their return they visited Tauranga, where in a hour or two they sprang up and declared, "Hau ora take patiti kia te patapahia te tangata e haere ana ki Wanganui ki te patiti i te pahohā" &c.

Our people here are very quiet and industrious at present. I am sure you will be pleased to see again some white men when you come to visit Mokau. The natives are under an impression, that there will be another tau pahia, and this among other motives stimulates them to work.
