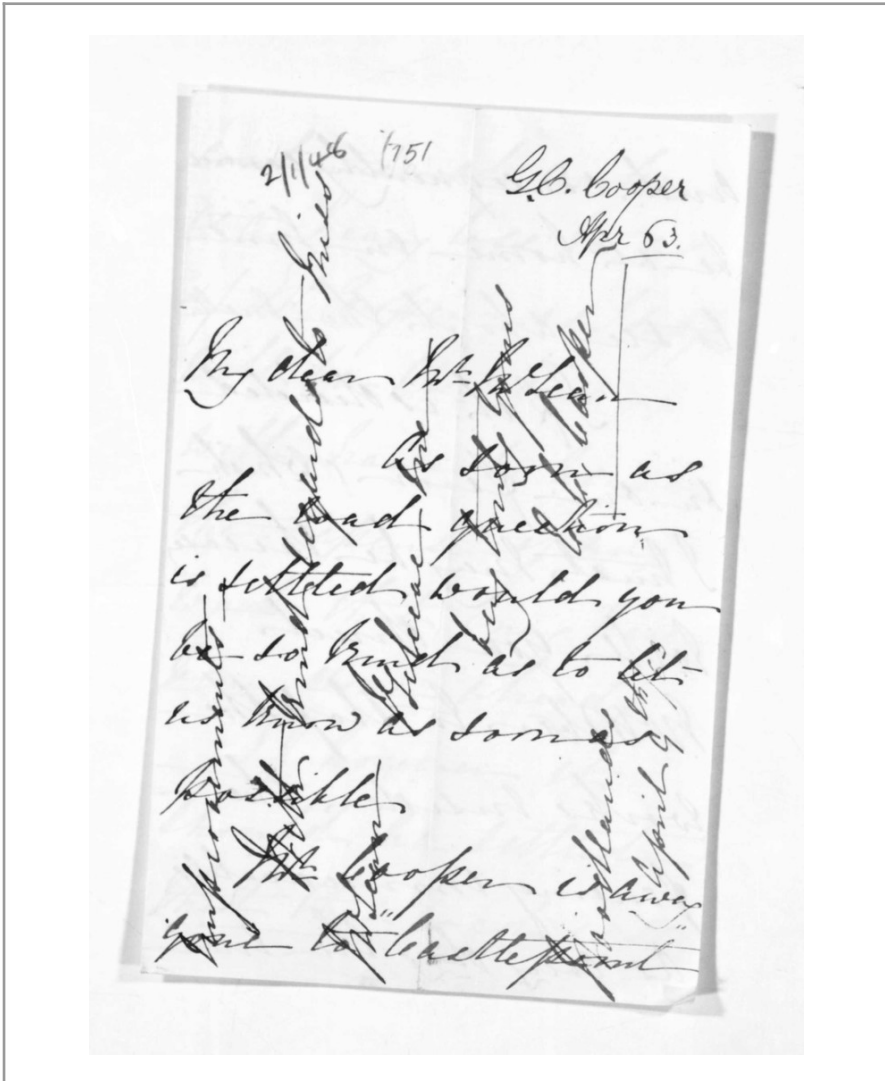

As soon as the road question is settled would you be so kind as to let us know as soon as possible.

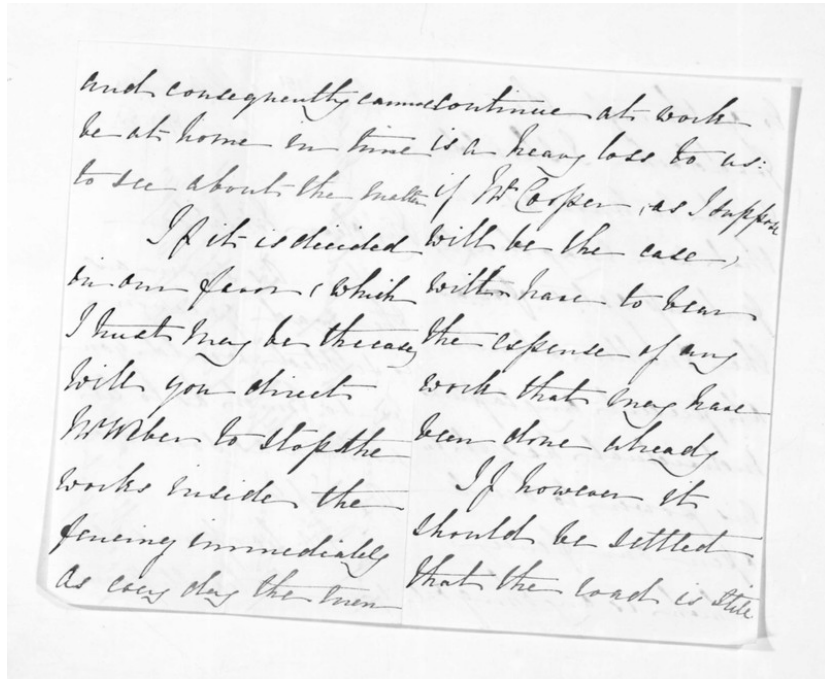
Mr. Cooper is away gone to "Castlepoint"

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
and consequently cannot be at home in time to see about the matter.


