Dear Sir  
I am in receipt of  
your letter of the 27<sup>th</sup> ult. in which  
you inquire about our Licenses  
Our price for two tooth lambs  
is five guineas each (amount  
of a year, not picked; the pick  
would be 15 guineas but there is  
really very little difference in  
them and no difference if they  
are to go to any other bones than  
hundred Licenses - we sold  
our studs last year at the two  
prices named above, and we  
could have sold double the  
number had we had to offer;  
we shall only have about  
100 or 120 to sell this season
