

I enclose a note received from Major Mair which gives all the Native news - Everything wonderfully quiet throughout the District, and not a word about Te Kooti, who seems to be keeping very close somewhere - If permitted, I suppose he will retire into



Titokowara —

At the request of Mr.
Commissioner Clarke, I have
chartered a cutter to take 19
tons of potatoes to Whakatane,
being a present from the Heteranga
to the Whakatane natives —

The telegraph line between
here and Tauranga is being
erected as fast as could be
expected at this time of the year.
